Notes from the Office

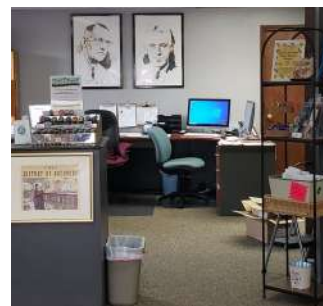

Special Thanks to Cindy H. for helping in the store this month, and a hearty welcome to Renee F. for joining our team!

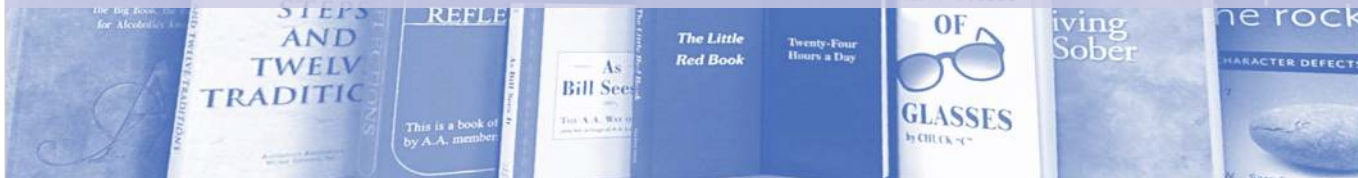

To the AA Community:

Alcoholics Anonymous World Services - AAWS - has increased TVICO's cost for GSO Approved Literature by over 20%. We try keeping the cost down by purchasing in a higher quantity to receive a discounted price from GSO, however, we aren't able to purchase higher quantity on some of the GSO approved Literature. Our cost, for the Big Book (Hard Cover), has increased over \$2.00 per book, and the Big Book Softcover has increased over \$1.50 per book (even with the higher quantity discounted pricing). Even with the price increase being passed onto the customers and fellowship, we are still offering home groups and individuals discounts when they purchase 10 or more of the same GSO approved literature. Other vendors have increased our pricing, in the prior months, and we are trying to keep that price as minimal as possible, as well.

DRUNKS

We died of pneumonia in furnished rooms
where they found us three days later
when somebody complained about the smell
we died against bridge abutments
and nobody knew if it was suicide
and we probably didn't know either
except in the sense that it was always suicide
we died in hospitals
our stomachs huge, distended
and there was nothing they could do
we died in cells
never knowing whether we were guilty or not.

We went to priests
they gave us pledges
they told us to pray
they told us to go and sin no more, but go
we tried and we died

we died of overdoses
we died in bed (but usually not the Big Bed)
we died in straitjackets
in the DTs seeing God knows what
creeping skittering slithering
shuffling things

And you know what the worst thing was?
The worst thing was that
nobody ever believed how hard we tried

We went to doctors and they gave us stuff to
take that would make us sick when we drank
on the principle of so crazy, it just might work,
I guess or maybe they just shook their heads
and sent us places like Dropkick Murphy's
and when we got out we were hooked on

Paraldehyde or maybe we lied to the doctors
and they told us not to drink so much
just drink like me
and we tried
and we died

We drowned in our own vomit
or choked on it
our broken jaws wired shut
we died playing Russian roulette
and people thought we'd lost
but we knew better
we died under the hoofs of horses
under the wheels of vehicles
under the knives and boot-heels of our brother
drunks
we died in shame

And you know what was even worse?
was that we couldn't believe it ourselves
that we had tried
we figured we just thought we tried
and we died believing that we hadn't tried
believing that we didn't know what it meant to
try

When we were desperate enough
or hopeful or deluded or embattled enough to
go for help
we went to people with letters after their
names
and prayed that they might have read the right
books that had the right words in them
never suspecting the terrifying truth
that the right words, as simple as they were
had not been written yet

We died falling off girders on high buildings
because of course ironworkers drink
of course they do
we died with a shotgun in our mouth
or jumping off a bridge
and everybody knew it was suicide
we died under the Southeast Expressway
with our hands tied behind us
and a bullet in the back of our head
because this time the people that we
Disappointed were the wrong people
we died in convulsions, or of "insult to the
brain" we died incontinent, and in disgrace,
abandoned
if we were women, we died degraded,
because women have so much more to live up
to
we tried and we died and nobody cried

And the very worst thing
was that for every one of us that died
there were another hundred of us, or another
thousand
who wished that we would die
who went to sleep praying we would not have
to wake up because what we were enduring
was intolerable
and we knew in our hearts
it wasn't ever gonna change

One day in a hospital room in New York City
one of us had what the books call
"a transforming spiritual experience"
and he said to himself

I've got it
(no you haven't you've only got part of it)

and I have to share it
(now you've ALMOST got it)

And he kept trying to give it away

we tried to hear it
we tried and we died

We died of one last cigarette
the comfort of its glowing in the dark
we passed out and the bed caught fire
they said we suffocated before our body burned
they said we never felt a thing
that was the best way maybe that we died
except sometimes we took our family with us

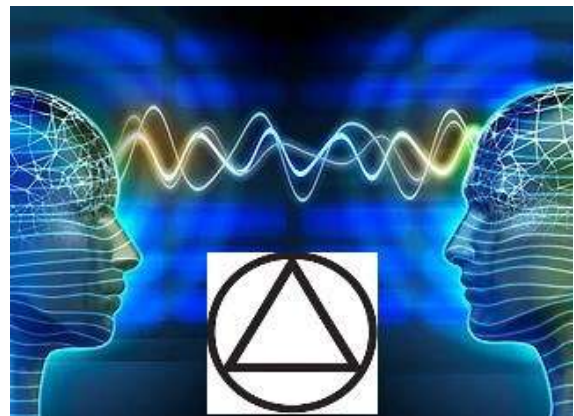
And the man in New York was so sure he had it
he tried to love us into sobriety
but that didn't work either, love confuses drunks
and he tried and still we died
one after another we got his hopes up
and we broke his heart
because that's what we do
And the very worst thing of all was that every
time we thought

Until a day came in a hotel lobby
and it wasn't in Rome, or Jerusalem, or Mecca
or even Dublin, or South Boston
it was in Akron, Ohio, for Christ's sake

A day came when the man said I have to find a
drunk because
I need him as much as he needs me
(NOW
you've got it)

And the transmission line
after all those years
was open
the transmission line was open

And now we don't go to priests and doctors
and people with letters after their names
we come to people who have been there
we come to each other
and we try
and we don't have to die.



What is Treasure Valley Intergroup Office of Alcoholics Anonymous Inc.?

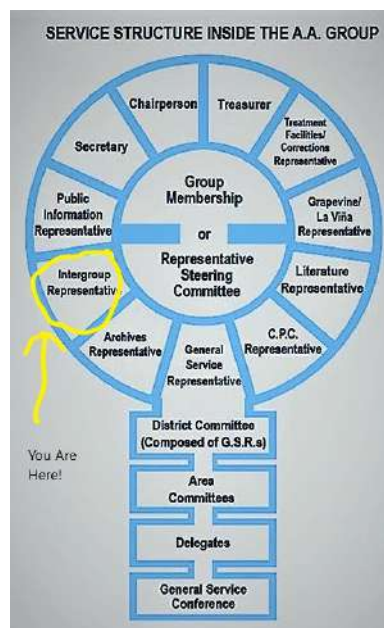
Treasure Valley Intergroup Office of Alcoholics Anonymous, Inc. was created as an Idaho Nonprofit Corporation on July 20th, 1979. For 42 years we have had an Intergroup and Central Office in operation, serving autonomous AA groups in the Treasure Valley keeping AA alive and well to carry the message to the alcoholic who suffers from the disease of alcoholism. For many, many years Intergroup has sponsored fellowship events including: Lefty Callahan Raft Race, New Year's Solution Party, Halloween Party, Founder's Day Picnic, Super Bowl Extravaganza, and the Mack's Creek Campout. These events were created to foster Unity within the A.A. community and also raised funds for the viability of the Central Office.

The past few years, since the onset of the COVID-19 virus such Unity activities have been halted for the safety of our fellowship. In 2023, things are beginning to change and Intergroup is in the process of planning fun fellowship events soon! Intergroup continues to have monthly meetings to keep our local Central Office viable and to continue to foster Unity and to carry the message via local Intergroup Representatives of local groups.

Long Timer's Interview

(To preserve the AA Message and Carry it to Alcoholics; to preserve local history; to educate and inspire)
August 13, 2023

Name: **Candice C.**

Sobriety Date: **9/3/92**

Homegroup: **Chubbuck Sunday Night Group in Chubbuck**

BEFORE A.A., a little about yourself:

Birthdate: **1976**

Birthplace: **Utah**

When did you start Drinking? **Age 12**

How did you decide you were an alcoholic? **I admitted I was alcoholic when I understood I had no control over my drinking.**

How did you hit bottom? **When I woke up in a hospital after an intentional overdose and saw my mother crying in the corner, that was my bottom.**

What was your life like? **I was young because I was 16 years old living in my mother's house in Rexburg.**

RECOVERY:

How did you discover Alcoholics Anonymous? **A crush of mine went to treatment and came back telling me I should go to an AA meeting with him.**

How old were you when you entered the rooms for the first time? **16**

Where did you attend your first meeting? **Rexburg, ID**

Were there a lot of meetings in your town? **No just one per week**

Did you get a sponsor right away? **No there were no women who had worked the steps available to me**

Have you had the same sponsor throughout your sobriety or have you had different ones?

I've had different sponsors

Were there many minorities at AA meetings? **Nope. It was pretty male, pale, and stale.**

Were meetings attended mostly by men Or were they equally attended by women? **Men**

Was there a particular time when there was an increase in women who attended AA meetings that you can remember? **I don't recall really**

Have you ever held a general service position? **yes** If so, what was your first service position? **GSR** How many years sober were you? **4 years**

What was your first impression of Trusted Servants, or the Idaho Area 18 Delegate back then?

My impression was that I knew very little and didn't understand what was going on. I thought general service was "politics" and didn't understand what a Delegate did.

How about AA Service in General, were you interested in how the AA General Service Structure worked and the role your home group played? **It wasn't until I was later in my sobriety that I began to understand the service structure and how our 3rd Legacy worked.**

Did you attend Area Assemblies? **I attended Area Convention, but not assemblies.**

I didn't attend assemblies until I was a GSR at 4 and 5 years of sobriety.

Were Group Business Meetings, or District Meetings different than they are today? **District meetings in Pocatello are much more structured than they were back when I was a GSR. Robert's Rules of order are observed and we have standard reporting.**

What is the most conflict you have seen at an AA business meeting? **Any throwing of chairs?**

I've never seen chairs thrown. I have however seen a nose to nose confrontation with a finger in the chest. It was an example of what I don't want to be in service.

What kinds of advice would you give a new GSR today? **Be present. Don't try to be perfect. Accept that service is about learning new things and is not black and white. Being of service can be ambiguous and that's ok.**

In your sobriety, have you ever seen new groups form because of a resentment and a coffee pot? Do you know any of the history of Idaho Area 18 AA and about how certain different groups were formed? **I helped start the Young People's meeting in Pocatello. It wasn't quite formed with a resentment, but certainly with an attitude of "we can do it better than you". Many times new groups are formed because we are creating the Fellowship we crave.**

Have you always attended the same Home Group? **No. Throughout the years, changes in my life have necessitated changes in home groups.**

In your opinion, is it important to choose one home group to belong to? **Yes**

What do you think holds a home group together? **Adherence to Traditions.**

Do you sponsor people? **Yes**

Are you currently involved in AA General Service? If so, how? What is your favorite part of giving this service to the program of AA? **I currently serve as Panel 72 Delegate for Idaho Area 18. My favorite part of service is the relationships God allows me to cultivate and nurture.**

How important is service work? Over the years, have you witnessed a newcomer, or perhaps even a long-timer get and stay sober without participating in General Service at all? **General Service is not for everybody. Some of us are very good at doing behind-the-scenes service like making coffee and setting up the meeting room. Some excel at working with newcomers. Service looks different for everyone.**

In your early sobriety, were there many AA fellowship events? **I don't believe there were more events, but we did have more "meetings after the meeting"**

What kinds of things would you all do for fun? **In the summer we would go to local swimming holes. We would also go into the mountains and build fires. My favorite times were at the local coffee shop together.**

Was there really such a thing as "The meeting after a meeting"? What was that like? **For sure.**

In Pocatello, we would go to JB's or Poppa Paul's and have dinner and coffee sometimes until 1:00am.

Do you think that still happens today? **I don't see it happen so much today.**

Have you ever attended an International AA Convention? **San Antonio and Atlanta**

Have you ever attended PRAASA? **yes** What was one of your favorite times at PRAASA?

At PRAASA in Hawaii we went to a local meeting and it was probably one of the best meetings I've ever been to. The group is called "The Black Experience". It was a ball.

What has been the most difficult Life on Life's Terms event you have experienced in your Sobriety?

Divorce and physical injury in 2015

What has been your ultimate Spiritual Experience in AA?

Attending the General Service Conference was an indescribable experience.

How do you define Serenity? **Feeling comfortable in my own skin**

What do you think has been the most significant CHANGE in A.A. since the days you got sober?

I don't know about the most significant change in AA, but I've changed significantly!

What doesn't happen anymore, around A.A. these days, that you wish still did?

Meetings after the meeting.

What do you think of electronic/online AA Meetings?

I think they are of great use for those who prefer/need them.

How about electronic/online Assembly Conventions?

Again, important for those who prefer or need them.

What message do you have for the newcomer? **You are welcome here.**

How were early AA Newcomers treated back in the day? **Newcomers were often treated gruffly and without much compassion. I'm grateful to see we've gained a little more compassion.**

In your opinion, how important is AA Literature or AA Guidelines and the AA Service Manual to a newcomer's recovery? **AA Literature can be lifesaving. However, it is not the end all and be all. Guidelines are meant to be flexible and the Service manual is ever changing. It is the human connection we make with newcomers that makes the most difference.**

What are some of the biggest AA controversies you have experienced in your sobriety?

Smoking vs. non-smoking in meetings, "affiliation" with the court system and signing attendance cards, and the resignation of the General Service Board Chair.

Is there anything you regret, during your sobriety, while involved with Alcoholics Anonymous?

Not anymore. There's a step for that.

What is the grandest Gift the program of Alcoholics Anonymous has given you?

The Gift of a relationship with a Power greater than myself.

As a long-timer, you have probably experienced the passing of many AA friends you have met along the way. What brings comfort, if any, in dealing with these experiences of loss as they occur?

This is a great question. It's very complicated if one of those friends has passed as a result of this disease. It leaves a feeling of uneasiness as well as a complicated gratitude that I get to remain sober. For our friends who pass on to the big meeting in the sky, I'm grateful for the time I got to have with them and make sure to pass on to others what they passed on to me to honor their memory.

What helps you most to keep coming back to AA, daily? **I wish I had some sage answer for this, but it's actually routine. I am in a healthy routine and have a life that I love as a result. That makes it easy to maintain.**

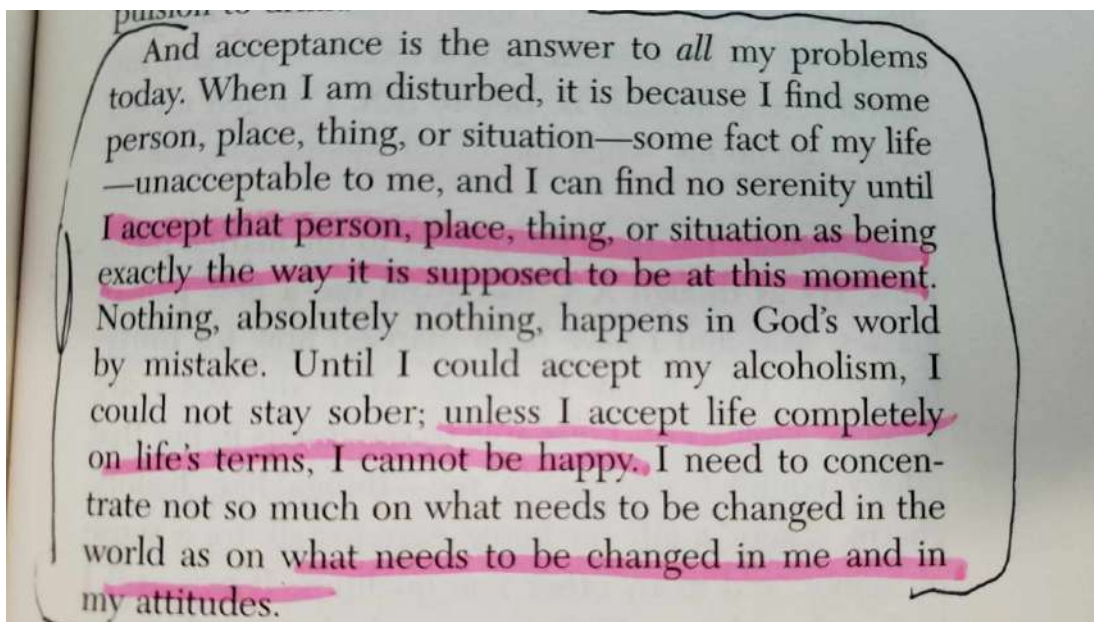

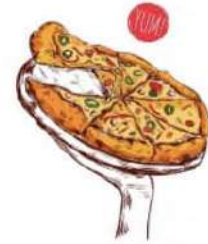

WHAT IS RULE #62?

In the book, Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, under Tradition Four (“Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole”), there is a story about a group who took their autonomy too far by wanting to set up a fancy treatment center for alcoholics. It became so big that they adopted 61 Rules. Instead of serenity, however much confusion resulted, personalities surfaced, and finally the group exploded in frustration when they knew they could not manage such an endeavor. It was at this time, the head promoter of the idea realized he was wrong, was able to laugh at himself, and to keep the group together and with humility wrote a sentence on small card that said, “Rule #62: Don’t take yourself too damn seriously”.

Rule #62 is a way to remember to see life as fun, enjoyable and to approach each day with an ability to laugh at ourselves, to laugh with each other, keep it simple, and lighten-up!
